Weekly Fellowship Meal | Families of Ridgewood have brought food for their own household and extra to share with visitors. Fellowship is one way we endeavor to 'encourage one another' in our Christian walk. (Acts 2:42-47, Hebrews 10:24-25)

UNIT 4 - SECTION 2

The Holy Spirit

OUESTIONS TO LEARN:

 God has told us that we must pray to him for the Holy Spirit.

God's Holy Spirit enables us to repent and believe. The Holy Spirit led Paul to Philippi to proclaim the truth about Christ to Lydia and her household, and thereafter opened Lydia's heart to understand her need for a Savior. Over the years, however, many overzealous preachers have not trusted in God's Spirit to accomplish a genuine, inward work of grace in people's lives. One such man was the famous nineteenth-century revivalist Charles Finney, whose preaching often worked people into an emotional fervor that they sadly mistook for salvation.

The Opened Heart

Claudius admired the selection of sheer linens that his supplier had spread across the floor of his gift stall in the Philippi marketplace. "Lydia, you must have every color imaginable, but my favorite is still the 'royal purple.' And it's my best seller too. The wealthy Roman officials are especially fond of it."

Lydia accepted Claudius' compliment with a smile. She imported the "royal purple" from her business contacts back in Thyatira, and had already noticed how much it was in demand among the Roman soldiers and dignitaries who were now living in Philippi. She had certainly made her move to this bustling town at just the right moment, financially speaking.

But money had not really been her motive. She still was not quite sure why she had decided to uproot her household and move to a new province. After all, it was especially hard for her to practice her religion here, since there were so few Jews in Philippi. They didn't even have a synagogue in which to meet. She herself was not a Jew, but she had come to see that the God of the Jewish Scriptures was the only true God. Somehow she felt that he had drawn her here, that he was trying to show her something she had been unable to see before.

Ten miles east, in the coastal town of Neapolis, Paul was getting off the ship from Troas. He and his companions—Silas, Luke and Timothy were on a mission trip from Antioch.

Before sailing, the group had tried to go into two other provinces, but the Holy Spirit had shut the door on those attempts. Then Paul had had a dream about a man from Macedonia, the province that included Philippi. In the dream the man had begged Paul to come there and help the Macedonians. So Paul and his companions had traveled from Troas to Neapolis, and the door was open wide. They had only to seek out those whose hearts the Holy Spirit was opening to Christ.

The missionaries made their way first to Philippi, arriving just before the Sabbath. Early in the morning of their day of worship, they left the city through the west gate and made their way to the Gangites River, where they had planned to find a quiet place to pray.

The women were already in prayer at the riverbank when Paul's

group arrived. Seeing them, Paul urgently felt their need for Jesus.

"Have any of you heard about Jesus of Nazareth, the one who was crucified in Jerusalem and on the third day was resurrected to eternal

life?" he began.

At the mention of the name, Lydia's heart beat a little faster. "We heard talk of him before we moved here from Thyatira," she conceded, "Who was he?"

"He is the one who sent me to you," Paul said. "His Holy Spirit led me to come to Macedonia and find those whose hearts the Lord was preparing to receive salvation. Before he was crucified, Jesus promised to send his Spirit to reveal the truth about himself to those who would recognize him as their Savior."

As Paul spoke, that same Spirit of God opened Lydia's heart to all that Paul said so that she understood and joyfully embraced the good news about Christ. This was what she had been yearning for. The women of her household also believed, and all were baptized there on the banks of the Gangites by the four missionaries.

From that moment on, Lydia supported Paul's Macedonian ministry in whatever ways she could. She no longer considered herself her own, but put her home and wealth at God's disposal with great thankfulness for the work he had done in her heart. Taken from: Acts 16:6-15.

FROM THE BIBLE:

One who heard us was a woman named Lydia, from the city of Thyatira, a seller of purple goods, who was a worshiper of God. The Lord opened her heart to pay attention to what was said by Paul. (Acts 16:14)

If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will the heavenly Father give the Holy Spirit to those who ask him! (Luke 11:13)

The Man Who Tried to Save Evans Mills

On an evening late in the spring of 1824, a sizable crowd filled the schoolhouse in Evans Mills, New York. Tonight Charles Grandison Finney would light a revivalist fire that would blaze across the American frontier.

But that night, Finney was not happy with what went on. As he

But that night, Finney was not happy warmed to his preaching—explaining yet again about God's judgment and about salvation through Christ—Finney observed his audience. One man in the third row was dozing while his wife smiled and nodded her head now and then at what Finney said. The others also looked pleased with his sermon, when they weren't whispering back and forth making plans for Sunday dinner.

"Why, I've been preaching to them every night for weeks, and they are still staring at me with the same glazed-over serenity. They just don't get it," Finney thought. "I believe it's time to light a fire under their carefree hides."

He stopped mid-sentence and glared at his congregation for a long moment. The woman in the third row nudged her husband awake. Then Finney shouted loudly, "Do you admit that what I've been preaching is the truth? Well, do you?"

Rows of sinners gazed back at him, speechless.

"Most or all of you profess to believe it. But do you really? Know that if you do not repent and believe this moment, then you are rejecting the Lord's gospel. Who is ready to do what he ought to do? A horse may trample you to death tonight and you may never get another chance. Now what will it be?" He raised his voice even louder, and reached far over the lectern pointing his finger around the room. "Those of you who are ready right now to commit to God, stand up. Those of you who are not interested in salvation, just sit there."

For what seemed like many minutes, not a head was turned or a breath exhaled. But all eyes discreetly flitted around the room to see what the others would do. No one moved an inch.

"Very well," Finney declared, "you have made your choice! You have rejected the Savior. Now go home. I will only preach one more night here, and then I'll move on to a town where people are willing to turn from their sins and follow Christ. I just hope you are all able to come back here tomorrow night." Then Finney watched silently as the congregation, stunned and bewildered, filed out of the schoolhouse.

The next night, Finney tells us in his memoirs, the anxious townspeople followed him through the streets and packed the schoolhouse "to its utmost capacity." Would this really be their last chance to repent? Who would do it? No one wanted to miss out on the hubbub. Some didn't want to miss out on salvation. Almost everyone was there.

That night, Finney told the people of Evans Mills everything he knew about hell. He preached for more than an hour, describing in great detail the misery of eternity apart from God. By the end of his sermon, the children were weeping into their mothers' laps, all the men were pale, and some of the women had fainted away at the prospect of what lay before them. Just as Finney had planned, the congregation was now a powder keg of emotions.

Finney looked down on them fiercely. "I'll be right here tomorrow night," he said, and again abruptly walked out of the schoolhouse. He had given them no chance to repent! The stage was set.

Over the next several nights, the people poured into the schoolhouse in a state of high agitation. Those of every religious and moral persuasion squeezed in. One man brought his gun and threatened to kill Finney for working his wife up into a terrified fervor. Finney took no notice, but preached his heart out and commanded them, "Now, sinners, do your duty and repent of your transgressions. It will be told tonight in heaven and hell what you decide to do. Here is the window you can jump through to salvation. It's open just a bit. Come to the front right now if you choose the way of Christ!"

Revival had come to Evans Mills. Or so it seemed.

As Finney honed his revival style, the people of Evans Mills and nearby towns in which he preached were powerfully moved. On many nights, as he threatened and shamed them, dozens leapt up and made their way to the front. Some came groaning and yelling. Some got only a few steps before they fell to the ground weeping or bawling. Others joined the fray not wanting to be left behind, struggling to the front just to see what would happen. In the end, Finney was quite satisfied that the people in and around Evans Mills had come to their senses and grabbed hold of salvation.

Although few doubted that Charles Finney knew the Lord himself, many in his day and since have condemned his methods. He preached as if people could repent of their sins and believe in Christ in their own power, simply by deciding to. It was true that some genuinely came to Christ during these services, but many who thought they had been converted during Finney's revival meetings had only had their feelings stirred up. Lacking the Holy Spirit's conviction, they were not truly sorry

for their sins and did not really trust in Christ. They went forward only because their emotions were inflamed—they feared hell, or they thought they wouldn't get another chance. Some went forward just because everyone else did. Sadly, some of them never recovered from the confusion and disappointment of their "revival" experiences.

FROM THE BIBLE:

Now we have received not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit who is from God, that we might understand the things freely given us by God. (1 Corinthians 2:12)

"Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven. On that day many will say to me, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in you name, and cast out demons in your name, and do many mighty works in your name?' And then will I declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from me, you workers of lawlessness.'" (Matthew 7:21-23)

TALKING IT OVER:

- 1. Remember that repentance means being sorry for sin and forsaking it because it displeases God. Do you think all of the people who came forward in Charles Finney's revival in Evans Mills really became Christians? Why?
- 2. What does God give us to help us repent of sin and believe in Christ for forgiveness? Can we repent and believe without the Holy Spirit's help?
- 3. Do you think there are people who appear to believe in Christ when they really don't? How do you know if you are truly a Christian? (A true Holy Spirit in his life. See Matthew 7 above.)
