Weekly Fellowship Meal | Families of Ridgewood have brought food for their own household and extra to share with visitors. Fellowship is one way we endeavor to 'encourage one another' in our Christian walk. (Acts 2:42-47, Hebrews 10:24-25)

Glorifying God

QUESTIONS TO LEARN:

The right response to God's glory is one of wholehearted devotion and obedience. John the Baptist rejoiced to see Jesus growing in popularity, even though it meant his own ministry would wane. The sixteenth-century reformer Bernard Gilpin showed unwavering and loving obedience to God throughout difficult personal trials. In these ways, their lives brought glory to God.

Only a Voice in the Wilderness

The shore and shallow waters of the Jordan River outside of Bethany were teaming with repentant Judeans waiting their turns to confess their sins.

John the Baptist, wearing his trademark camel's hair tunic and leather belt, stood in water up to his waist, waiting for an old man to wade out to him.

"What sins do you confess, friend?" John asked the old man.

"I am a tax collector, and have often collected more money than I was entitled to, even from the poor. I . . . I kept much money for myself," he admitted solemnly.

"And do you now repent of these sins and seek God's forgiveness?" John asked.

"Yes. I want to be right with God and to obey Him."

John eased the old man backwards, dipped him briefly under the water, and lifted him up again. John then turned to the crowd and addressed them in a loud voice, "I am baptizing you only with water to signify your repentance from your selfish, ungodly ways. But there is already one among you who you do not yet know, the sandals of whom I am not worthy to untie. He will baptize you with the Spirit and with fire." He said this because he knew that many of them mistakenly thought he himself might possibly be the Christ for whom all the Jews were waiting.

After the old man waded off, John glanced up to see who was next. As he did, he noticed a stranger coming toward them along the riverbank from the direction of Galilee.

At the sight of him, John's heart leapt in his breast and beat furiously until the man arrived on the nearby shore. It was Jesus. John ran out of the water to meet him.

"You must baptize me, John," Jesus said.

"Oh, Lord, but I need to be baptized by you who are without sin!" John exclaimed. "And do you come to me?"

"Let it be so now; it is proper for us to do this to fulfill all righteousness," Iesus assured him. So John consented and escorted Jesus down into the Jordan and baptized him. As Jesus emerged from the water, John saw heaven open up and the Holy Spirit descend and light upon Jesus like a dove. God had told John that he would know the Christ because he would see the dove descend and remain on him.

Then John heard a voice from heaven say, "This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased." John fell on the bank and worshipped Jesus, while the people crowded around them, baffled.

"This is the one I've been telling you about," John told them. "He is the one about whom I said, 'He who comes after me has surpassed me because he was before me.'" (By this he meant that Jesus' earthly ministry would begin after John's had, but that because Jesus is God he has always existed and therefore was before John.) "He is the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world! The reason I came baptizing with water was so that he might be revealed to Israel. He is the Son of God."

Two of John's followers had listened intently to this testimony. As Jesus emerged from the river, they made their way through the warm sand and waiting crowd to reach him. When Jesus saw them, he turned and asked, "What do you want?"

"Teacher," they said, "where are you staying?"

"Come and you will see." So they followed Jesus to the house where he was staying and became his disciples.

Not long after this, John was baptizing at Aenon, near Salim, because the water there was deep and the people were eager to repent. He was disappointed when some of his followers interrupted him to settle an argument for them.

"Why are you disputing among yourselves at a time like this? Look at all those people waiting for our encouragement. Receive them!" John demanded.

"But Teacher," one of them said, "the one you baptized and said is the Lamb of God . . . well, he is baptizing just up the river, and more people are going to him than are coming to you! You must do something."

Again John felt his heart jump within his breast and then pound with joy. "Ah," he thought, "he finally has begun his work! The kingdom of God is at hand, and my job is done."

To his jealous followers, John said gently, "I told you all along that I was sent only to prepare the way for him. Now that he has come, he must become greater; I must become less.

"Jesus is from above and is above all. He speaks the very words of God. The Father has placed all things into his hands. Whoever believes in the Son has eternal life, but whoever rejects the Son will not see life, for God will not forgive him. Now go. Join the others who have already left me to follow him and find life."

The True Story of a Blessed Broken Leg

November 23, 1558

My Dearest Sister Cecily:

I write to you not from the stockades, as you probably expected, but as a free man, and I will soon be on my way back to you and all my dear parishioners in Houghton. The Lord has delivered me from my enemies in a most dramatic fashion! You must tell the story, as I can't bear for another hour to go by without my friends and family hearing all that God has done.

As you know, I was recently on my way to a martyr's death, to be tried for heresy in London before the infamous Bishop Bonner. He, of course, was, until a week ago, the puppet of Queen Mary, who had pledged herself an enemy of our "reformed" Christianity. She was determined that none would publicly acknowledge that the Bible is supreme over Church doctrine, and that salvation from sin is through Christ alone.

Because I love you, though, I have tried to faithfully preach biblical truth to all of you whom the Lord has entrusted to my spiritual care. Of course, it was this preaching, along with my disagreement with many practices of the Catholic Church to which Queen Mary was devoted, that got me into trouble with Bonner.

When I first got word that I was to be tried for "heresy," it frankly took my breath away. I knew that what Bonner termed heresy was in fact the truth given to us by the Lord in his Holy Scripture. Still, it stung to be publicly accused of the very thing I am so dedicated to fighting against—distortions and lies about the gospel of Jesus Christ.

I took this to my Father in prayer instantly, and he showed me that I might do more to reveal the deceptions of the Catholic Church by publicly dying for the truth he has set out in Scripture, than by proclaiming it from a pulpit for the rest of a long life. And so I quickly came to welcome the idea of being beheaded or burned at the stake for my Lord Jesus. And if it would glorify God more for me to live, then he could and would accomplish that too, in whatever manner he chose. For this reason, I rejected the pleading of many friends to flee Houghton before Bonner's guards came for me.

I clung to the Lord's promise in Romans 8:28, which says, "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose." This I had preached in our parish time

and again. I knew that God had graced me with love for himself and that God had called me according to his purpose, first to know him, then to become rector there in Houghton, and finally to be accused of heresy during Queen Mary's persecution of the growing number of reformed believers. And I knew the Lord fulfills his promises. Thus, I rested in the assurance that whatever happened to me in this crisis would be his working for my good and for the good of others who loved or would love him. I clung to this promise constantly, with thanksgiving and growing anticipation of what he would do.

I prayed it when the guards came to the church to arrest me on October 29. I prayed it during the long and difficult days of the journey to London when I was bound in ropes and fed too little. I prayed this when on the ninth day of our journey—not too far outside London—I fell from the wagon and broke my leg. And I prayed it when the guards cursed me after my accident, angry at the delay. Indeed, they overheard my prayers and ridiculed me for thinking that God had allowed me to break my leg for my own good. Yet they seemed to grow a bit frightened at this and to wonder what this God I was so sure of might do next.

I was still clinging to this glorious promise when two other guards rode into our camp on November 21st to give us the amazing news that Queen Mary had died on November 17th. Most importantly, the new queen, Mary's sister Elizabeth, is sympathetic to reformed thinking and promptly upon inheriting the throne declared the martyrdom of reformed believers at an end. Shaken and surprised, my guards gently untied my ropes that morning, obviously reverent of what the Lord had done. I pray that they will be the first among those for whose good God performed these mighty acts on that road to London.

So you see, dear sister, my broken leg kept me from arriving in London until Queen Elizabeth ascended the throne. As soon as I am sufficiently healed, I will return to you. But you must tell the story now so that the greatest good for the greatest number results from these events. To his Glory!

For 26 more years the Lord did indeed use Bernard Gilpin to his glory. This beloved rector of Houghton went on many mission journeys alone. He gave very generously to the poor until his death, opening his operate a grammar school in Houghton.
